Information about Nasal Naloxone (Narcan)

In an overdose opioids can slow breathing to the point of death. Nasal naloxone (sometimes called Narcan) blocks the opioids and restores normal breathing when sprayed into the nose of someone who has overdosed.

The medication has no potential for abuse and can be given by a non-medical person. Find out where you can obtain a naloxone kit and receive training on how to prevent and recognize an opioid overdose. https://www.mass.gov/overdose-prevention-and-naloxone-access
