About

MassHousing is an independent, quasi-public agency created in 1966 and charged with providing financing for affordable homeownership and rental housing in Massachusetts. The Agency raises capital by selling bonds and lends the proceeds to low- and moderate-income homebuyers and homeowners, and to developers who build or preserve affordable and/or mixed-income rental housing. MassHousing does not use taxpayer dollars to sustain its operations, although it administers some publicly funded programs on behalf of the Commonwealth. Since its inception, MassHousing has provided more than \$29.5 billion for affordable housing. The Housing Stability Department (HSD) provides a variety of programs and resources aimed at promoting positive tenancies, reducing evictions, and creating opportunities for residents of affordable rental housing. HSD leads Inter-governmental collaborations to address disparities in housing access and stability for at-risk populations; offers program and grant support to help MassHousing partners foster inclusive, safe, healthy and thriving communities; and organizes learning opportunities that focus on the intersection of social issues and affordable housing. Residential Assistance for Families in Transition (RAFT) program

RAFT is administered by eleven Regional Administering Agencies (RAAs) as well as the Rental Assistance Processing (RAP) Center operated by Nan McKay and Associates (NMA).

The RAFT Program is a homelessness prevention program funded by the Executive Office of Housing and Livable Communities (EOHLC). RAFT provides short-term financial assistance to low-income families who are homeless or at risk of becoming homeless. The RAFT program helps keep households in stable housing situations when facing eviction, loss of utilities, and other housing emergencies. RAFT can provide up to \$7,000 per household (directly to the landlord, utility provider, mortgage servicer, or other vendor) within a 12-month period to help preserve current housing or move to new housing.

Tenancy Preservation Program

The Tenancy Preservation Program (TPP) is a homelessness prevention program. TPP works with tenants, including families with children with disabilities, facing eviction as a result of behavior related to a disability (e.g. mental illness, intellectual disability, substance abuse, aging related impairments). TPP functions as a neutral party to the landlord and tenant. In consultation with the Housing Court Department, TPP works with the property owner and tenant to determine whether the disability can be reasonably accommodated, and the tenancy preserved. The TPP does not provide any financial assistance.
